Course description: This course is designed to broaden and deepen students' knowledge of cultural theories and their empirical applications through a discussion of key works in cultural sociology. Readings will focus on the relationship of culture to politics, social class, and the economy.

Requirements: Students are expected to complete the assigned readings before class and actively participate in class discussions. The course requirements include an in-class presentation (~25 minutes) and a final exam (14-16 pages to be completed outside of class, due June 5). The presentation should briefly summarize essential points from the readings and conclude with two critical questions for discussion. We will discuss final exam topics on Week 12 (May 13).

Evaluation: The course grade will be composed of class participation (10%), the presentation (20%), and the final exam (70%). Late submission of final exams is allowed up to five days after the deadline and will be subject to a 3-point (out of 100) reduction for each day late.
