

# HIST 192Y: Principles of Atatürk and the History of the Turkish Revolution II

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**HIST 192Y is a general introduction to the history of the late 19<sup>th</sup> Century Ottoman Empire, the founding of the Turkish Republic, and of developments in the Turkish Republic to the 21<sup>st</sup> Century.**

- **The Lectures** are a complement to the readings, which means that the lectures will not repeat the readings. Instead the lectures will provide an overall framework for the readings and additional information that is meant to help the students understand the general themes emphasized in the term.
- **Virtual Office hours:** Because of the necessity to continue on-line education during this term, and the fact that our lectures will be recorded and then put onto SUCourse+, I will also provide the opportunity for you to ask me questions directly over Zoom, Google Meet, or whatever application you prefer. This the “synchronous” aspect of the course, and you can simply send me a message to request a meeting, and we can arrange a time that is convenient in order to talk.
- **The Exam** will focus on short paragraph writing. The exam will test to what extent the students have taken notes in class, completed the assigned readings carefully, and have attempted to combine the information from both sources into a more comprehensive and more profound understanding of Turkish history.
- **Readings** will be largely from Carter Findley’s *Turkey, Islam, Nationalism, and Modernity*. I strongly recommend that you buy the hardcopy of this book, but a pdf version of this book will be provided.
- **SUCourse+** will be utilized frequently for this course. For that reason, you should familiarize yourself with the SUCourse+ page for this course immediately. The readings for this course will be placed on SUCourse+ and an email will be sent the university email account of each student. This means that there will be no excuses for not completing the readings since all students will be amply informed about each reading assignment. Furthermore, you also need to get used to checking your university email account frequently since all communications from this course will go to your university email account.
- **Attendance: Attendance for the lectures is mandatory.** Attendance will be taken at the beginning of both hours of the lectures. The number of students present will also be compared to the number of signatures.
