

ECON 321 - Education Economics and Policy – Spring 2021 Sabancı University, Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences

Course Overview

Education affects individuals' productivity and earnings in the labor market. At the individual level it is also associated with other outcomes such health investments, risky behavior, quality of life and has a bearing on children through intergenerational investments. At the aggregate level education affects human capital stock, economic growth, income inequality. This course will focus on economic theory and econometric methods to investigate economic issues in education. We will start with the theories of education that either view education as an investment or as a signaling device. We will discuss research on returns to education and heterogeneities in these returns across countries. The nature of education production functions, role of various inputs and long-run implications of education for growth will be covered. Throughout the course we will focus on educational policy issues and the challenge of making causal inferences.

Other Required Readings

Additional readings will be assigned throughout the semester around the topics covered in class. There will be in class discussion of these assigned readings. Participation in discussions will be

expected and evaluated. There may be occasional unannounced quizzes on assigned readings and other course material covered in class.

This is an online course that will be taught as synchronous-live sessions. We may use either Google Meet or Zoom. Video recordings of the lectures will be posted on SuCourse+. If you miss a class, it is your responsibility to go over the course material.

For proctored exams, your webcam and microphone should be on during the exam. In the case of non-compliance with this and other declared exam procedures, your exam will be void. Make sure to check that your webcam and microphone function properly before the exam.

You must attend the synchronous Zoom lectures, recitations, etc. and real-time online exams with your SU email account.

Grading

There will be:

- i) one midterm (30 %) scheduled for the 7th week of classes-class time
- ii) a critical review and classroom presentation of articles with an empirical content that addresses one of the topics covered in class within the Turkish context (25 %) This will be a *group work* due 10th week of classes, 5 pages maximum, double spaced excluding references
- a term paper prepared *individually by each student* that involves data analysis due last week of classes (30 %). The students will retrieve required data from available resources (such as TUIK web site), analyze the data using statistical software and discuss their findings. The topic of analysis will be announced during the course. The text of term paper will be 3 pages maximum, 1.5 point spaced. The references, tables, figures cannot exceed 3 pages.
- iv) in addition, 15 % of your grade will be based on class participation that includes completing assigned readings prior to class, participating in classroom discussions and some (potential) quizzes.

The course grade is solely based on the grading scheme stated on the syllabus. There will be no exceptions to this (like doing additional assignments).

Rules of Conduct

The definition for scholastic dishonesty is given in the rules and regulations of the Sabancı University. In the case of scholastic dishonesty, no credits will be given for that particular work. Cheating during written work will result in an F for the course. All incidents of scholastic dishonesty will be reported to FASS for disciplinary action..
