1. Brief Introduction

What is the meaning of a close relationship? What predicts a satisfying relationship? What are the factors that have an influence on relationship maintenance? Why do people have conflicts and engage in violent behaviors in their close relationships?

This course aims to answer such questions based on the scientific findings. We will rely on the theories and studies in the fields of psychology, communication science, and family studies. We will focus on the topics including, but not limited to, attachment, attraction, love, passion, trust, family violence, and relationship dissolution.

2. Course Hours and Structure

This course will be composed of both synchronous and asynchronous parts.

Asynchronous sessions: The instructor will upload the video presentation of that week to the Course Website.

Synchronous sessions: We will meet online to discuss about the topics of that week and have a mini-exam (see below).

Mini-Exams

Mini-exams will include a mixture of different types of questions (e.g., essay, fill-in, free-response, open-ended questions, and/or multiple-choice questions). Questions in the mini-exams are based on everything (i.e., slides, discussions, videos etc.) covered in lectures and all the reading materials (e.g., assigned articles).

See the timeline below for the dates of the mini-exams. The lowest grade of the 4 will be deducted when your final grade is computed.

If the number of mini-exams you took is less than 4 at the end of the semester, you will get zeros as many as the number of missed min-exams (e.g., if you attended only 1 mini-exams, you will get three zeros).

Poster Homework

Poster homework will be a group work. Each group will be composed of 3 individuals. You are free to create your own group. If you prefer to work alone, it is acceptable as long as you let us know when the groups are assigned. However, I may change the members of your group and/or assign additional members to your group.

Each group will be assigned one of the relationship science theories listed below:

- · Implicit Theories of Relationships
- Privacy Management Theory
- · Cascade Model of Relational Dissolution

Assignments of the theories to groups will be made randomly during the class time after all groups and their members are decided. You will be notified about the expectations and detailed instructions during the semester.

• Reaction Paper after the Guest Speakers' Presentations

- You are expected to write a reaction paper based on <u>ONE</u> of the two presentations.
- You do <u>not</u> need to write two papers. However, you can if you want to. If you submit papers after both presentations, the one with the higher grade will be considered in your final grade calculation.

Attendance will be taken during the presentations. If you did not attend, please do not bother to submit a paper, because it will not be graded.

If you missed one of the two presentations, you are allowed to attend the other one and write a reaction paper. If you missed both of the presentations, then there will not be any make-ups.

I'm going to send you the guidelines for reaction papers during the semester.

Bonus points

There will be a bonus of 5% of the poster presentation grade. This is a 5% bonus, not +5 bonus points. For example, if your poster grade is 80, the bonus points you will get for your final grade computation will be 80*5%=4 points.

• Research points (Extra credits)

Students can optionally serve as participants in research that is run by Sabanci University researchers. By participating in research, you can get research points. For this course, you will be able to earn up to 6 research points (1 credit equals $^{\sim}$ 29 minutes of research participation). These 6 RP points will be converted to 3 points added to your overall total at the end of the semester. More information on the available research projects will be provided during the semester.
