Course description

Humanities 321 this summer focuses on predominant variants of a broad literary/artistic movement known as Realism and comparatively considers how depictions of everyday life, the ordinary, the political and cultural interpretations of "reality" changed over time in different geographies. Throughout the course, we will discuss how forms of Realism both reject and interact with tenets of Romanticism, the artistic movement that preceded it. The course will canvass the development of literary Realism from the 19th century to the 1960s by taking three major writers as examples: Leo Tolstoy, Bertolt Brecht and Gabriel García Márquez. In addition to the literary texts, we will observe corresponding techniques in and "art" that attempted to depict life it as was with its social ills or tried to depict what social life "should be" based on the social and cultural background of the authors.

The Goal of the Course

By the end of the course, students will 1) have solid understanding of various modes of Realism and the socio-cultural and political dynamics to which they correspond 2) understand how Realism was co-opted for political purposes during the age of dictatorship—the 1930s, 3) recognize how Realism in "The Global South" took another path based on its indigenous traditions and practices far from the European metropole while still representing the social and cultural dynamics of class antagonisms and 4) demonstrate comprehension of the materials through a series of short papers and exams.

Course Requirements:

Students attend ALL classes having done the necessary preparatory work. Class participation is a substantial portion of the final grade. This is a seminar, which means that your regular, active participation is expected. Attendance is compulsory in lectures and discussion sections. Failure to attend more than two times will result in a reduction of points from the overall grade. Students who miss more than 9 hours of classes/discussions in total will automatically lose the participation grade. Medical reports are subject to the approval of the instructor. The instructor retains the right to decline a medical report.
