Course Description

This course introduces the students to certain fundamental texts and key discussions in Western philosophy. It does not require any background in philosophy, but through a rigorous exploration of some of the key debates in the history of philosophy, it provides a comprehensive overview of the development of Western philosophy and of its defining moments. The readings are selected from the Ancient Greek, Hellenistic, Medieval, and Enlightenment periods, when some of the classical discussions of philosophy have been articulated; and they represent discussions from different philosophical areas, such as moral philosophy, philosophy of being, and philosophy of knowledge. The discussions are presented with emphases also on their historical context, on their relationship to the intellectual climate of their time, as well as on how they contrast with the opposing views on the same question.

Attendance:

The course will be held synchronously on Zoom. Please keep your cameras on during class. Students are expected to attend the synchronous Zoom lectures and discussions with their SU email account.

Lectures will be recorded. Lecture videos will be accessible on SuCourse until the discussion section following the lecture and 5 days before the exam. It will not be possible to access the videos at any other time. It is the student's responsibility to follow the lectures. Discussion sections will be recorded for archiving purposes, but will not be shared.

Attendance is not taken in the lectures, but students are strongly encouraged to attend the lectures at the scheduled hour. Lectures will not be repeated and/or summarized during discussion sections.

Attendance (camera on) in discussion sections is compulsory. Students who do not have their cameras on will be regarded as absent.

Attendance follow-up starts at the end of the add-drop period. Attendance is taken on an hourly basis during the discussion sessions. After 1 unexcused absence your attendance grade will fall by 1 point with every unexcused absence. (That is to say, with 2 unexcused absences you get a 9/10, with 3 you get 8/10, etc.)

Absences for medical reasons are to be documented with a doctor's report.

An absence may also count as excused in case a life situation that you need to attend arises: in such cases please email me beforehand, if possible.

In order to take a make up exam, the medical report must be submitted within 3 days after the original exam date.

Participation in class:

Thoughtful and meaningful participation in class and during the discussion sessions is expected and highly encouraged. In order to get full participation grades students should share their thoughts and questions on the course either during the lectures or the discussions (by talking or via chat box), or during office hours, or via email to the instructor or the course assistants.

Outstanding contribution to the class and proof of engagement with the course material beyond course requirements may bring your final course grade by half a letter (thus bringing it up from a B- to a B, for example), at the instructor's discretion.

In-class Quizzes:

There will be unannounced quizzes during lectures. There will be no make ups for missed quizzes. If a student is absent on the day we have a quiz but they have emailed me before class to let me know about their excuse, that quiz will not be included in their quiz average. Anyone who is absent without an excuse will automatically get a zero on that quiz. At the end of the semester everyone's lowest quiz grade will be dropped.
