Material to be Covered: Economics 202 examines how the overall level of national economic activity is determined, including output, employment, interest rates and inflation. The course focuses on the main theoretical issues in macroeconomics. It will introduce you to the major issues of economic growth, business cycles, balance of payments, unemployment, financial crises, and inflation that form the core of macroeconomics. Building on the basic principles of economics, we develop a framework for understanding the role of monetary and fiscal policies in stabilizing the economy and promoting growth, with a focus on contemporary policy debates.

Homework and Quizzes: Homework will be assigned on a regular schedule. Late homework will not be accepted (unless it is the result of an officially excused absence). The lowest homework score will be dropped. There will be five random quizzes during the session. Missed quizzes may not be made up (unless this is the result of an officially excused absence). The lowest quiz score will also be dropped.

Exams: There will be a midterm exam and a final. These exams are scheduled on the dates below. The final exam will be cumulative, but with an emphasis on the material covered since the midterm.

Participation in class and sections: 5 percent of the overall grade. Positive participation means paying attention, asking and answering questions, and being prepared for class.

You will be assigned an **Essay**, through the end of the summer session. Paper should be 2-3 pages, double space typed. You will need to briefly restate the problem addressed in the article and relate the analysis to course work. Be sure to define and explain unfamiliar terms and concepts. **Hard-copy** is required!
