#### Course Overview

Humans use language to think, remember, and communicate. This course provides an overview of research on the psychology of language. Students will be exposed to a wide range of topics related to language including but not limited to the evolution of language, communications of non-human animals, language acquisition in infancy and childhood, second language learning, the neural processing of language, and language education. The course equips students with a theoretical and methodological understanding of research on language and the mind.

## Readings

One or two articles or book chapters will be assigned each week. All readings will be available on SUCourse one week before the corresponding lecture. Students are expected to read the assigned text material *before* each lecture.

## Grading

The course grades will be determined by allocating 15% to the midterm exam, 45% to the semi-cumulative final exam, and 25% to the presentation (20% for presenting and 5% for evaluating other presentations), 10% to reading questions, and 5% to attendance and participation.

At the end of the semester, the letter grades will be assigned by using the following table.

**Exams.** We will have a midterm exam and a semi-cumulative final exam. Students will be tested on the material from lectures and assigned readings. There will be multiple-choice and short-answer questions. The final exam will be semi-cumulative. The final exam covers the first half of

the course (i.e., before the midterm exam), but some topics may be omitted (the instructor will be announcing these topics).

You may take a make-up for a missed exam with an official medical excuse. To take a make-up, you must contact the instructor and TA <u>within three days</u> (e.g., if you miss an exam on Thursday, you must contact us by the following Monday).

**Presentation.** Students will do a **20-minute group presentation (15 minutes if alone)** on one of the topics covered in the course. Groups will be determined after the add-drop period, based on the class size and availability. Each group will be presenting **in person** during normal class hours **except for special cases.** 

**Presentation evaluation.** Students will also evaluate presentations by other students. The evaluation will be graded in terms of whether the student demonstrates a full understanding of the presentation content. The evaluation form will be filled out and submitted online.

**Reading questions.** When readings are assigned, you will be submitting at least one question per paper. The question will be graded on whether it is a thoughtful question demonstrating that the student read and understood the reading. To receive full credit, you must provide a brief background or context for your question and demonstrate you have read and understood the reading. Students are expected to go beyond factual questions such as "What does the word X mean?" and submit questions that can facilitate discussion. Your questions can address theoretical ideas, methodology, or implications of the research.

Your questions will be graded as:

- 0 = no question
- 1 = factual question or question without context
- 2 = thoughtful question demonstrating that the student read and understood the reading

**Attendance and Participation.** In each class, students receive different points depending on their participation in class (0 = absent; 1 = present but not really participating; 2 = present and participating). We check both attendance AND participation because it is college, and students should not get full credit just for coming to class. Students may also receive extra points at the end of the semester for regularly participating in-class activities and discussions.

When you expect to miss a class due to circumstances beyond your control (e.g., major medical problem, family emergency), you may contact the instructor and TA to discuss the possibility of having their absence excused (i.e., Not counted towards the overall grade). Each case will be evaluated individually, and there is no guarantee. Thus, students are advised to try not to miss any class. Students are also responsible for making arrangements to learn the missed materials.

*Extra credit.* As mentioned on the last page of this syllabus, students can participate in research studies to gain up to 3 bonus points. Students may also receive extra points at the end of the semester for *regularly participating* in-class activities and discussions.

## Communication

For any questions or requests, <u>email both the instructor and TA in one email</u>. The subject of your email should include the course code (PSY 314) and clearly indicate the content of your email (e.g., "Question about PSY 314 Midterm"). The main body of your email should include the names of the recipient (e.g., "Hello, Dr. Kanero") at the beginning and your full name at the end. ## Extra Credit - Research Participation (up to 3 bonus points)

Students can optionally serve as participants in research conducted by Sabanci University researchers to earn bonus points. You will be able to sign up for experiments and earn your Research Participation Points through the online Sona system at <a href="http://sabanciuniv.sona-systems.com">http://sabanciuniv.sona-systems.com</a>. The detail of the system can be found in Research Points - GuideForStudents Spring 2023.pdf on SUCourse.

For this course, you will be able to earn up to 6 Research Participation (RP) points (1 point equals ~ 30 minutes of research participation). These 6 RP points will be converted to 3 bonus points and added to your overall total at the end of the semester. In other words, you receive <u>0.5 class bonus points for 1 RP point</u>. If you are earning 4-6 RP points (2-3 class bonus points) for this course, at least 1 RP point (0.5 bonus points) *must be* earned from in-person studies.

Research points can be still earned if online studies are available. There may be fewer or no research participation opportunities, but we *do not* plan to add other extra credit opportunities.
